The Texas State Organization Headquarters Building is certainly a showcase for our Texas organization as well as a busy workplace. Committees, chapters and coordinating councils have enjoyed having a place to meet. Visitors continue to come. The business operations of the organization keep the place buzzing. Plans are being made for you to enjoy a tour of the Texas Headquarters as part of the convention at Las Colinas in June.

Texas continues to have wonderful chapter treasurers! You are to be commended for being so positive, cooperative, and supportive. New and experienced treasurers accepted the challenge of collecting and reporting the dues this fall. Your hard work is greatly appreciated.

April 1 is a very important date, so mark your calendar. Keep it in mind when your chapter initiates new members this spring. If the initiation is before April 1, the initiate must pay 2011-12 dues (\$60,) scholarship (\$1 or \$.40) and the initiation fee (\$5.) All of these monies are sent to the TSO Headquarters in Dallas. If initiated after April 1, only the \$5 initiation fee is sent to Headquarters. Make it a priority to send the money and the yellow initiate card along with a Form 18 immediately after the initiation. The information included on the card is the means by which the new member is entered into the Society data base and the means by which she receives all of the Society communications. Both the initiate card and the reinstatement card can be downloaded from the International website. A Form 18 should also accompany the card(s) and the payment.

April 1 is also the deadline for contributions in order to be recognized at convention and for PACE. There seems to be some confusion about the contributions to Scholarships. All members are required by the International Constitution to pay a \$1.00 scholarship fee with dues. This is not the same as the "Honors" recognition in the convention program. Chapters must give an additional \$1.00 per member to receive that recognition.

Contributions are certainly welcome at any time! Any contributions postmarked after April 1 will be recognized the following year. Note the word "postmarked." Spending extra money for special delivery is not necessary. The state contribution form is found on the state website. It may be used for contributions to Texas State Organization or to ASTEF.

Spring is a great time to recognize 25 and 50-year members. Certificates are available from the TSO office. E-mail or call, and they will be mailed to you. The cost is \$2 for the 25-year and \$4 for the 50-year certificate.

Plans are being made for a great workshop this summer at the convention in Las Colinas. See you there!



In the summer of 2011, the scholarship that began with a bequest from this former Nu Chapter member helped me to fulfill a long-time dream of studying language in a Spanish-speaking country.

Although the primary goal of my trip was to study Spanish at the Costa Rican Language Academy in the capital city of San Jose where I spent most of my time, I also learned much about the culture of several nations, as well as geography and agriculture. The matching funds provided by my scholarship enabled me to take advantage of excursions arranged by the school: I visited two volcanoes, swam in volcano-heated water, walked on hanging bridges through and above the cloud forest, watched monkeys play in trees hanging over a highway, joined the faithful at a basilica, and took part in a coffee-testing demonstration on site at the plantation. In my favorite moment, I saw both the Pacific and Atlantic Oceans from the top of one volcanic peak. Charming and knowledgeable guides taught me botany, zoology, geology and history in a country that often looks as if the rural roadsides have been landscaped. Of course, there were those "free Costa Rican massages," as one van driver described the bumpy road experience.

Fellow Epsilon Alpha member Deborah Parrish, who is fluent in Spanish, was my travel buddy. While I learned to use the past tense and expanded my command of idioms in classes that ranged from two to six students, she had private lessons in advanced grammar and culture. Our instructors were capable young graduate students from the nearby university. My language lessons continued in our home stay experience. Breakfast and dinner conversations with our gracious hostess Zeneida and a fellow student were as rewarding as the classes. My Spanish improved as I listened to Zeneida tell of her life as the wife of a banana plantation manager in several South American countries, including during one revolution. The third student in our "family," a retired gentleman from Japan, pursued his own interest in the environment and shared his experiences with us. All of this was education that only travel can provide.

As an added bonus, Debbie and I were invited to attend a meeting of the Executive Board of the Costa Rican Chapter of The Delta Kappa Gamma Society. We enjoyed our fellowship with these lovely ladies and discovered that the issues that concern our chapters are consistent no matter where we wander! It is truly wonderful to share so much with key educators in another land.

Dr. Seuss says it best in "Oh, The Places You'll Go!": "You're off to Great Places! Today is your day! Your mountain is waiting. So . . . get on your way!"



com•mu•ni•cation - DKG Style

The dictionary defines com•mu•ni•ca•tion as information transmitted or exchanged in written or verbal form or through behavior. Communication DKG style incorporates each of those forms on various occasions. Think of the ways. Likely our first thoughts turn to newsletters as the primary form of DKG communication. Yes, Society information is conveyed in print through publications and electronic means, but chapters also use telephone trees and prepare elevator speeches to buzz about events and advantages of membership. We communicate the fellowship of DKG through warm smiles and friendly greetings. Whatever the form, there are some elements of DKG style we should remember.

- Use the full name of the Society

 The Delta Kappa Gamma Society International. Use Texas State Organization (TSO).
- DKG is an acceptable reference to the Society, but the terms sorority and club are not used. Capitalize Society when referring to the international organization, and capitalize Purposes.
- Use the term Founders to refer to the twelve women who organized the international Society. Dr. Blanton is named first. Use charter members to refer to the original members of a chapter.
- The names of Society boards, funds, and committees are written in lower case, e.g., executive board, world fellowship fund, communications committee. Exceptions occur when an international entity has the word Fund in its proper name, e.g., International Speakers Fund.

Society pamphlets, our Texas State Organization website, the "Lone Star News" have all have taken on a quality, updated look. Many chapter newsletters followed suit. To the 160 chapters in Texas who have published editions this fall, we congratulate you on your efforts. If a chapter newsletter were discovered in your home and read by a nonmember, she could readily infer this is an organization of purpose and professionalism tempered with fellowship and fun. And why not? That's communication- DKG style.
