McAllen welcomes TSO June 14-17, 2023



McAllen is the second largest city in the Magic Valley. Early on, visitors saw that sugar cane, cotton, and citrus orchards, irrigated with plentiful Rio Grande water, grew like magic in the Magic Valley. Hundreds of thousands came to the Rio Grande Valley (RGV) from northern states for the subtropical climate and relaxed living.



The Rio Grande Valley is home to many **cultures**. Most of the Valley's locals are Hispanic and bring folklore from previous generations. The main traditions that visitors see in the RGV originated in deep Mexico from Mayan natives, whose customs passed down from generation to generation and are now in everyday lives.



Agriculture is a large part of the stable economy of the area. The arid climate is conducive to growing citrus, sugar cane, potatoes, spinach and other heat-tolerant vegetables. In addition, crops can be grown year-round, allowing farmers to rotate planting and harvesting throughout the year.



Leisure time is well-spent in McAllen and the surrounding area. The Rio Grande Valley is one of the most exciting places to live, work and play. As one of the most culturally diverse areas in the nation, it offers art, music and entertainment that members won't find anywhere else. McAllen is one of the many Valley towns and cities along the Rio Grande River, the fifth **longest** river in North America and the 20th longest in the world, which forms the border between the State of Texas and Mexico. McAllen is a gateway to Mexico with two international crossings, the McAllen-Hidalgo International Bridge and the Anzalduas International Bridge.

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Celebrating innovations in 2021-2023 biennium

As the 2021-2023 biennium moves swiftly to a close, reflecting on the innovations for the Texas State Organization of DKG during the last two years is exciting. Three examples of these innovations are making strides in technology, hiring additional staff for the TSO headquarters, and planning and implementing regional area workshops.

The technology committee planned and presented three virtual workshops. A variety of topics and collaborations were covered in group meetings as well as breakout sessions. As a result, members

were able to learn, share ideas and give feedback for other future technology events. The largest and most successful event was held in person over 24 hours in Cleburne. Sixty-plus attendees participated in four different breakout sessions that provided participants with CPE credit and knowledge of Google and cybersecurity. The success of this event sets the foundation for other technology-focused workshops.



As our foundation ASTEF celebrated

ten years, the business side of TSO and ASTEF has steadily increased the workload of the headquarters staff. Although TSO and ASTEF have been able to employ DKG members to work at headquarters in the past, the complexity of bookkeeping for the two businesses has become more and more labor-intensive. Therefore, it was apparent that the personnel committee should hire a qualified professional bookkeeper. A professional staffing agency found the bookkeeper for TSO and ASTEF. Vanessa Diggins brought 20-plus years of experience to the Dallas headquarters office.

Finally, the Executive Committee explored the idea of a regional area workshop model that will be set into motion for June 2024. They also designed a creative model with input from members around the state to meet the needs of TSO members.

TSO will continue to seek new opportunities to meet the needs of the membership in the bienniums to come.

ASTEF important to all members

Alpha State Texas Educational Foundation (ASTEF) is important to all TSO members, as the foundation is the funding arm of the Delta Kappa Gamma Texas State Organization. ASTEF Board members are elected for six-year staggered terms so that about one-third of the board rotates off in odd-numbered years and new members are elected by TSO members who are present at the ASTEF Annual Meeting

during the TSO Convention. New ASTEF Officers are elected by the current board to take office on July 1 of odd-numbered years. ASTEF Officers for 2023-2025 will be elected in a virtual meeting of the ASTEF Board on June 11.

Gruenau Hall, a gathering place

On May 1, 1898, a group of German settlers organized the Gruenau Turn and Schuetzen Verein, an athletic and shooting club just north of Yorktown, Texas. They built the original Hall

that became the center of the Gruenau community. In 1927, a larger Hall was built. Twice a year, sausage feasts were celebrated in May and October. Weddings and other family parties took place. Eventually, Gruenau and the other buildings like it became known as dance halls.

In 1974, I moved to Yorktown after my daddy retired from the Air Force. My Arkansasraised daddy was given my grandfather's membership in Gruenau. Membership at that time was still following the old traditions. Only men could be members, and that membership had to be inherited and approved. Women were considered members through a husband or father.

My first Feast was in May of 1974. The adults made the sausage and sides. Stuffed cabbage and desserts were made at home and brought in on Sunday. There were no jobs for the kids, so we played around on the dance floor or ran outside. We were offered the opportunity to help wash the sausage casings, an offer we never accepted. After the bingo stand had been put together and cleared of dangerous insects, we'd climb all over that.

My parents also worked the dances on Friday and Saturday nights. So again, my only job was running around and having fun. Many of those nights, I would fall asleep at a table with my coloring books as a pillow. When my uncle and his friends were in town, I would bus their table of empty beer and soda cans. My brother got really good at finding the change dropped at the bar window.



Gruenau Hall, Yorktown, TX

In my teens, it didn't seem that cool to go out and help with Feast. Hanging out with friends was more important. College came around, and getting out to the Hall to help with Feast wasn't part of my routine. The only times I would be there would be for a wedding or reunion.

Then in January 2007, the Hall burned down.

Out of those ashes, Gruenau has risen. A new hall was built. It has features that we could never have hoped for back in the old days—air conditioning and a huge kitchen. One of the biggest changes that came to pass was allowing women to join on their own. And now even I am a part of it as a member and the event booker. I do those jobs I wasn't allowed to do as a child, like tie sausage. It's almost as much fun as running around and falling asleep on a stack of coloring books.

Artist finds joy in creating wearable art

About 17 years ago, Barbara Ardis and her husband saw a craft booth selling jewelry made with dichroic fused glass. They were mesmerized by it. The makers offered a one-day workshop in San Antonio which the couple attended. Barbara was hooked.

To create pendants, earrings, rings and bracelets, Barbara scores,

Dichroic glass is a type of manufactured glass designed to change colors under different lighting conditions and viewing angles.

breaks, and stacks layers of opaque, clear and transparent colored glass, along with one or more pieces of dichroic glass. She fires these pieces in a kiln which she programs to fire at different top temperatures to achieve a variety of dimensions and textures. Dichroic glass has a metallic oxide coating that becomes a "shimmery" part of the finished

product after firing. The coating reflects and transmits light, giving each piece an eye-catching look.

Findings are parts used to join jewelry components together to form a completed article such as bails, earring hooks, rings or bracelets.

The artist has an image in her mind as she shapes and layers each piece. Melting and fusing glass this way doesn't guarantee a precise shape outcome. However, there is a fun (usually) element of surprise every time she opens the kiln. Once she decides how to finish a piece, she adds the findings for function and added beauty.

DKG investing in the future with Avenue M

DKG leaders and staff have reviewed and analyzed DKG membership statistics for many years. International and state membership committees have implemented different

In August 2022, the DKG Administrative Board appointed a task force to clarify a framework for a membership consultant project. The group was to report to the board electronically for approval of the project's scope and obtain proposals from potential consultants.

The task force sought consultants with the experience and expertise to analyze data, identify trends, and develop strategies to assist the Society, state organizations, and chapters in engaging members

and strengthening growth. Three consulting companies submitted proposals that the Administrative Board reviewed at the November board meeting.

The Administrative Board carefully weighed the cost and details of each proposal and

the value of professional, objective analysis. They approved the hiring of Avenue M as a membership consultant at the expense of up to \$55,000 to be paid from the Available Fund (pending a budget adjustment approved by the Executive Board). The Executive Board, comprised of state organization presidents, the administrative board, and past international presidents, approved this expense. At a February meeting, the Administrative Board authorized the DKG Executive Director and DKG International President to move forward with an agreement with Avenue M. The board sees this project as an investment in DKG's future and is committed to acting upon this study's recommendations.

DKG members are an integral part of this process. In addition to receiving past membership data and organizational information about DKG, Avenue M will conduct focus interviews and surveys with past, current and potential DKG members. The group will conduct interviews in April and May, and surveys will happen in June and July. The consulting group will present a final report in late August 2023, and the Administrative Board will share the results with the extended DKG community in the fall of 2023.



Sheri Long, president and CEO of Avenue M Group, believes associations must understand what matters to their members and understand their stressors and challenges. This would require listening to members and rethinking what matters to them.

Sheri chose the name Avenue M Group because she had a strong desire to help associations create a two-way street (or Avenue) between their organizations and their members (M) if they wanted to remain relevant in the future.
