The United Through Reading Program will be the Unifying Project for the 2012 Las Colinas Convention.

The Personal Growth and Services Committee is sponsoring the project. Chapters and individuals are asked to bring new books to the convention along with writable DVD's in clear cases. The books along with a DVD of a separated parent recording the



story will then be shipped to the children by United Through Reading's United Service Organization partner at Dallas Ft. Worth airport.

The United Through Reading website **http://www.unitedthroughreading.org** has book lists from which to choose appropriate books for the program.

With United States troops being deployed for lengthy amounts of time, the United Through Reading Military Program is helping ease the fear, uncertainty and anxiety felt by children in military families by providing them with opportunities for emotional connections that relieve the stress of separation.



Phone calls and Skype end when families hang up, but the recorded DVDs and books provided by United Through Reading are available to the children over and over. One mother explained that her daughter feels like her father is part of her every day because she still gets to read with him whenever she wants. She simply pops in a DVD. Another told of negative behavior by her son being reversed when he could see and hear his dad daily.

The concept of United Through Reading has proven to be a simple but effective way of keeping families connected. Texas State Organization will help make the connections.


Chapters are continuing to initiate new members. After you initiate, please send the initiate forms along with their dues and fees. The initiation fee is \$10. The chapter keeps \$5 and sends \$5 to State to be shared with International. The form is most important because it provides the information for State and International to send communications such as the newsletters and bulletins. Chapters are also reinstating members. Forms for both initiates and reinstatements can be found on the International website.



November 15 is the deadline for filing your chapter's 990-N. Has your chapter filed? Instructions are on the website and help is just a phone call away. We must have 100% filing this year.

Chapters are to be commended for their generosity in giving grantsin-aid and scholarships. According to reports from chapter treasurers (2011 Form 15), chapters awarded 248 grants-in-aid for \$91,595.00 and 68 scholarships for \$16,862.00. This is in addition to the scholarships and grants awarded at the state level which totaled \$36,250.00.



Secretary General Kofi Annan said "It is not in the United Nations that the Millennium Development Goals will be achieved. They have to be achieved in each country by the joint efforts of the governments and the people".

When I found out I was going to be a part of a Fulbright – Hays Project Abroad to India for the month of July, I began sharing my news with friends. While a few answered with "Wow, how wonderful", more often than not the response was "Why? Why would you want to go there and what will you do?". The group assignment was to look at India's progress towards the Millennium Development Goals and write curriculum to teach the goals at home. For myself I wanted to personally witness what an emerging country is like instead of experiencing it vicariously through an article or documentary.

So, was it all I expected it to be? It was so much more. It's another world - the vibrancy of color and sound and scent and volume of people will overwhelm your senses. The sheer contrasts of progress and regression and absolute poverty and extreme wealth are appalling. The logistical roadblocks to development are heart wrenching. But are there any solutions? Yes.

I visited slum schools, an HIV/AIDS home for children, a night shelter for street boys and women in dirt poor villages. The common shiny thread that wove through these encounters was HOPE. The organizations that are making the most impact are those that work with the people 'on the ground' in their environment. They aren't handing out answers. They build partnerships with the community and seek their input and resources to help them find strategies that will meet their specific needs and become self sufficient in the process. It's not about working for people, it's about working with people. But how can we help?

I traveled a side of India that most Indians never see. Yes, we can support the work being done with money and mobilization. But we need to Adopted by world leaders in the year 2000 and set to be achieved by 2015, the Millennium Development Goals provide concrete, numerical benchmarks for tackling extreme poverty in its many dimensions.

- Eradicate extreme poverty and hunger
- Achieve universal primary education
- Promote gender equality and empower women
- Reduce child mortality
- Improve maternal health
- Combat HIV/AIDS, malaria and other diseases
- Ensure environmental sustainability
- Develop a global partnership for development

'see' that side of life where we live too. We need to find a way to make a difference in our communities and then teach our kids to do the same. When we teach our youth compassion at home, we empower them to grow into adults who know it is possible to change the world.

Educational Impact



Bringing education to the children Krista Wallace, Executive Director Doulos Discovery School

In the central mountains of the Dominican Republic sits Doulos Discovery School (**http://www.doulosdiscovery.org**), a gem bringing education to the poorest children in the city of Jarabacoa.

The school was founded in 2002 through the vision of Krista and Chad Wallace. The Wallaces,

graduates of Texas A & M, moved to the Dominican Republic in 1995 as developers of high adventure camps with Young Life ministries. After seeing hundreds of children without a proper education, they dreamed of starting a non-profit private Christian school working to "equip and educate servant leaders in the Dominican Republic."

Currently, Doulos has 250 students in preschool through high school, with half of its students on scholarships. Providing a US level of education to the very poor has pushed Doulos to find creative ways to fund their school. All students pay tuition on a sliding scale, based on their earned family income. North American teachers and staff raise full support (US \$20,000 per year) and commit for a minimum of two years. Sponsors from the US commit \$100 per month to pay the tuition of sponsored students. Work teams serve the school through the continuous work of maintenance and

Chapter, Texas, is the executive director of the school and is assisted by Chad Wallace who also supervises Spirit Mountain Coffee Farm (**http://spiritmountaincoffee.com**) which is

owned by the Wallaces and provides income for the school. U.S. mission teams offer support by building new classrooms, renovating existing ones and helping the teachers as needed.

Zeta Gamma became involved with Doulos when Krista's mother, Carol Ann Adams, and Ruth Hull (Zeta

Gamma-1) went with a team to help. The chapter will always be connected to Doulos not only because of Krista and her mother, but because of the interest the chapter has with the school.



Delta Kappa Gamma has provided grant money for several expedition projects at Doulos. The first was providing a grant for 6th graders to explore the Caribbean, the coral reef, and the sea life beneath the waters. Many of the students had never ventured to the open water even though some had lived in the Dominican Republic all of their lives



Zeta Gamma helped provide supplies when Haiti had the earthquake. Doulos high school students assisted medical personnel in Haiti by translating for the English speaking doctors into French or Spanish. They also took food, clothing, and funds collected by the children.



The 2011 Alpha State Chorus members spent many hours in rehearsal while others were relaxing or sleeping. The result was a rewarding experience for the chorus members and beautiful performances for conference attendees in McAllen.

Calling all chapter presidents and all chapter Achievement Award chairmen! It is time to finish up those nominations for Alpha State Achievement Award and Alpha State Golden Rose Award because the deadline to file nominations is February 1, 2012.

Alpha State strives to recognize members who have given outstanding service to Delta Kappa Gamma at the state level by awarding either the Alpha State Achievement Award or the Golden Rose Award. It is the responsibility of the State Achievement Awards Committee to review completed nominations and to select the recipients for each award.



In order to qualify for the Alpha State Achievement Award, a member must have served as a chapter president and have completed two or more leadership roles at

the state level.

The Golden Rose Award is designated for those members who are not eligible for the Alpha State Achievement Award but have given years of service at the state level through workshop participation, committee work and

attendance at Delta Kappa Gamma conventions.

A good way to remember the difference in the Golden Rose Award and the State Achievement Award is that Golden Rose members have served more behind the scenes and have not held the state leadership positions required for the Achievement Award.

After the chapter's nominee is chosen and the paperwork is completed, the chapter's executive board must endorse the choice in a letter to the State Achievement Award Committee. It is also helpful to have a letter from a past state president as well as others who know the record of the nominee or have been mentored by the nominee.

Delta Kappa Gamma has been certified by the State Board for Educator Certification (SBEC) as a provider of Continuing Education Credit (CPE) for teachers. ASTEF is the fund raising and fund distributing arm of TSO. All members are encouraged to be knowledgeable about the many opportunities ASTEF offers its members. The main components of ASTEF are Scholarships, Leadership, and Projects.



SCHOLARSHIPS – Members have been granted scholarships for over 50 years. LEADERSHIP – In the early 1990's the Leadership Seminar was begun to give members additional leadership skills. PROJECTS – Beginning in January 2012, ASTEF will accept applications from members/

chapters that would like monetary assistance for projects they are planning.

The PROJECTS application will be found on the TSO website under ASTEF in January. The first stipends for PROJECTS will be presented at the 2012 State Convention.

Fire victims receive Emergency Fund aid

I live in Bastrop County. Since I am basically a city girl, my transition to the country has been bumpy; my husband loves everything about it. Any perils facing my adopted locale were the farthest thing from my mind on the afternoon of Sunday, September 4, 2011, when my neighbor's phone call awoke me from a nap with the news that a bad fire had started in the county and a small one was burning in our neighborhood. We'd better prepare to evacuate, he said, matter-of-factly. Evacuate! What does that mean? What do we take? How do we prepare? Little did I realize that thousands of my fellow residents were dealing with exactly the same questions at the same moment as had many other Texans over most of our state during this treacherous summer and fall of drought and imminent fire danger.

I did not see the gigantic smoke plume and raging flames until Monday. It was a horrifying sight I will never forget. Thousands were evacuated and in Bastrop County alone over 1,600 residences and 30 businesses were burned down before the multiple fires were under control. That doesn't count all the smoke damage and other damages, some caused by lack of electricity over an extended period. Almost immediately I was contacted by DKG members from around Texas and from other states asking the status of Mu Rho and Beta Theta members and also asking what they could do to help. Communication was very difficult and often frustrating. Current Area 7 Coordinator Joan Hester and immediate past AC Sandra Morales helped President Joanne Davis identify victims as quickly as possible.

A benefit of DKG membership that most of us take for granted but don't truly understand is the Emergency Fund gift. We don't understand it until we are in the position to qualify for it and the \$500 is in our hands. I'll never forget a note from a Katrina victim that I received, "Not a word yet from FEMA, and my insurance company is still taking information, but I have already received the check from Delta Kappa Gamma, even though I have no mailbox and no phone."

You understand then that we help each other – it is just what we do. We find out where our sisters are, what their damages were and how they can receive mail. We make sure the chapter president knows so that she can contact the state organization president who contacts Society Headquarters. Staff at Headquarters makes Emergency funding a priority over anything else so that in some cases the check goes out the same day the request comes in.

Any member who sustains property damage due to natural causes is eligible. \$500 is not a lot of money, but it can mean a lot to a family who has lost everything. It is just what we do - like chapters from all over central Texas bringing school supplies and clothing to Bastrop. I was very humbled when I delivered clothing to one Mu Rho member who lost everything. Wilda Vasquez told me her story of that horrible Sunday afternoon, and I realized as she shared that the reason that she and her husband had so little time was that they called every neighbor they could think of before the smoke was so thick they had to hurry to beat the flames. It is just what we do.

Bastrop County will never be the same people say. Maybe that is true. The magnificent pines that are truly "lost" now will grow back for other generations to enjoy. The trees that still stand will be appreciated more than ever and the

wildlife will return. But neighbors will look at neighbors in new and renewed ways. Gratitude to firefighters, emergency personnel and volunteers will be expressed. What really counts in life will be pondered more deeply and even a city girl can develop a new appreciation for the terrifying power of nature and the ever surprising well-spring of the generosity that is inherent in human nature.
